In addition to the comments I made last week concerning seeking peace. I would like to continue the thoughts that might encourage and help each of us take steps to have peace with others and therefore, have peace with ourselves.

"You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I tell you not to resist an evil person. But whoever slaps you on your right cheek, turn the other to him also. If anyone wants to sue you and take away your tunic, let him have your cloak also. And whoever compels you to go one mile, go with him two. Give to him who asks you, and from him who wants to borrow from you do not turn away. (Mathew 5:38-41)

I read a statement from an individual and her effort to enjoy life with a sense of peace. "I try as possible to be satisfied with everything, and never to believe for a moment that anyone means to mistreat me. If people are friendly and kind to me, I enjoy it; if they neglect me, or leave me, I am always happy alone. I make it my goal to have the attitude of Phillipians 2. My one aim, forgetfulness of self. I think the one thing that interferes more with my joy and peace is the feeling that I will receive kind treatment from all who I come in contact with.

Let nothing be done through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself. Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others. (Phillipians 2:3-4)

The Christian Life

Becoming a Christian in the first century entailed becoming someone wholly different. Several of Paul's epistles point this out to new Christians who, after having been initiated into the community of faith in Jesus, kept on living as they had before. The first Corinthian letter, as well as Paul's letter to the Romans, have sections devoted to the apostle informing the brethren how they were to conduct themselves in holiness and righteousness.

Peter urged believers to conduct themselves with holiness after the manner of God. For example, Peter juxtaposed holiness to sinfulness in a few examples from his second epistle. He reminded his audience of rebellious angels kept in chains for judgment (2 Peter 2:4), the pre-flood world (2 Peter 2:5), and the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah (2 Peter 2:6). Each of these examples was meant to convey to the church how they should strive for holiness. After all, Peter wrote, even righteous Lot was preserved when judgment came (2 Peter 2:7-8). Those who lived in a hostile environment then, Lot and Noah (cf. Genesis 6:8), were preserved when God's judgment came, so also Christians who lived in hostile times would be preserved and saved by God when His judgment is poured out on evildoers. Therefore, the righteous are not engulfed with the wicked.

Arising from the Jewish sentiment of separation, or sanctification, Christians followed a very Jewish path to being holy in the sense that they lived peculiar lives to outsiders. God was their standard, as was Christ the Lord. They were no longer to walk in the futility of the world's ways—ways that would be judged at the second coming of Christ. Rather, they were to be God's peculiar people in holy conduct and righteousness.

As early as Acts 9:2, Christianity was referred to as "the Way." This title used of Christianity only appears in Acts, and likely has Jewish underpinnings as to its meaning. It was not used in the Gentile church later. However, that it was called the Way denotes that Christianity then was as much defined by *how* the adherents to the faith lived as much as in whom they believed. The Way would have been in keeping with the Jewish idea of separating from society to be joined to God (cf. Leviticus 18:3, 24-28). In this case, it was to live vastly different from the norm.

Classical sources attest to Christianity being so different that it appeared odd—as odd to outsiders as Judaism was. Yet, what must be understood is that early Christianity, at least in its first few decades, appeared to be another Jewish movement. It was seen as a branch of Judaism just as the Zealots, Essenes, Pharisees, and Sadducees were. Once Gentiles began converting, nearly a decade after Christ's ascension, the different lives of once pagan people drew greater scrutiny to the faith. After all, the Jews were already known for being odd, but now that Gentiles remained Gentiles ethnically and converted to Christianity, things began to unsettle.

From The Church Files # 9

On November 10, 1912, the small Water Street congregation moved into the still unfinished building at Linn & Water Streets. They continued to meet here throughout the winter of 1912-1913.

In its original state, this building had no basement, no classrooms, no indoor plumbing, no baptistery & no central heating. Basically, this structure was one room measuring 39 x 45 feet and amounted to little more than a place to get in out of the weather and nothing more. There was one coal or wood stove in the room.

The church met under these conditions until a small bequest by a local banker made it possible in 1927 to make some improvements. The auditorium was reconfigured and small classrooms were added on either side of the pulpit. Indoor plumbing, a baptistery and a basement were all added and the exterior was stuccoed. The structure basically remained this way to 1950.
