The Beginning of Changes

Building off the previous two articles, I want to follow the strand of thinking about church history. Given the diverse practices, customs, and even church names, I wondered when things started to change. When you and I read our New Testaments, we see a unified state of things while the apostles lived. In all the churches, they appointed elders (Acts 14:23; Titus 1:5). The terms "elders," "pastors," and "bishops" were used interchangeably in the New Testament (Acts 20:17, 28; 1 Peter 5:1–4) and early Christian literature (Didache 15.1; 1 Clement 42.4; Polycarp, Philippians 5–6; Shepherd of Hermas Vis. 8.3).

Changes began among a cluster of churches by Ignatius of Antioch in AD 108-117. Ignatius was a disciple of the Apostle John, as was Polycarp, whom I cited above. Polycarp adhered to the two-fold structure of elders and deacons in the local congregations. Ignatius elevated one of the elders and called him "bishop." In his writings, he vested the bishop with such authority that the eldership (presbytery) was to be subject to him (Magnesians 2) and that nothing could be done apart from the bishop unless he appointed one of the elders to see to it (Trallians 2). The bishop was to oversee the Lord's Supper and baptisms (Smyrneans 8). The structure became the bishop of this network of churches over the elders and deacons. The person usually chosen to be bishop was either a disciple of an apostle or one closely tied to someone who had been a disciple of an apostle, such as Ignatius. The belief was that they knew better than others might. This form of leadership spread and became the prevailing model, contrary to what the apostles instituted.

In the fourth century, the theologian and priest Jerome wrote in his commentary on Titus the following:

The presbyter [elder] is the same as the bishop, and before parties had been raised up in religion by the provocations of Satan, the churches were governed by the Senate of the presbyters. But as each one sought to appropriate to himself those whom he had baptized, instead of leading them to Christ, it was appointed that one of the presbyters, elected by his colleagues, should be set over all the others, and have chief supervision over the general well-being of the community. . . Without doubt it is the duty of the presbyters to bear in mind that by the discipline of the Church they are subordinated to him who has been given them as their head, but it is fitting that the bishops, on their side, do not forget that if they are set over the presbyters, it is the result of tradition, and not by the fact of a particular institution by the Lord. (Commentary on Titus 1.7)

Seeing God's Good When It Looks Bad

But I want you to know, brethren, that the things which happened to me have actually turned out for the furtherance of the gospel, so that it has become evident to the whole palace guard, and to all the rest, that my chains are in Christ; and most of the brethren in the Lord, having become confident by my chains, are much more bold to speak the word without fear. (*Philippians 1:12-14*)

Paul had a special relationship with the Christians in Philippi; they were not only part of a church he founded, but they were also his friends. Sometimes our friends are confused at what God is doing in our life and sometimes we are even more confused! In Philippians 1:12-14, Paul wanted to reassure the Philippians that God was doing good even when it looked bad.

Considering how God set Paul free in Philippi, we shouldn't be surprised they wondered where the power of God was in Paul's present imprisonment. If Paul wasn't being advanced, that was all right because his passion was to see the gospel advanced. Even though Paul was in prison, circumstances around imprisonment, and his manner during it, made it clear to everyone he was not just another prisoner, but he was an emissary of Jesus; this witness led to the conversion of many including his guards.

God never wastes our time, though we may waste it by not sensing God's purpose for our lives in our present situation. Are you in a bad place – even a "prison" of some sort? God can use you right where you are, and He wants to. Stop thinking your situation must change before God's power can be evident in your life. It can be evident right now!

Library SCOTTISH HERITAGE # 1

In several ways, our modern American hymnody had its roots in Scotland in the 1700s. Four names stand out in the rich history of the Restoration Movement in Britain and each of them made significant contributions to the hymnody of our movement.

John Glas (1695-1773) was a theologian who gave his name to the Glassite movement. Significant to us is the fact that he saw the importance of publishing an early collection of hymns for their use.

Robert Sandeman (1718-1771) was Glas's son-in-law and a tireless worker in spreading the Sandemanian message which was basically the same emphasis on restorationism as preached by the Glassites.

James Alexander Haldane (1768-1851) and his brother, Robert Haldane (1764-1842), were wealthy Scottish industrialists who spent much money advocating New Testament Christianity in Scotland & England.
